


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### CHAPLAIN'S COMMENTS

It seems to me that most of the more traditional hymns I sang as a youth and young man in church are not heard very often these days; at least in the church I attend. One of the hymns remembered is "Faith of Our Fathers." The first stanza, "Faith of our Fathers living still, in spite of dungeons, fire and sword. O' how our hearts beat high with joy, whenever we hear that glorious word! Faith of Our Fathers Holy Faith! We will be true to thee till death," has a familiar reminiscence of our ancestors during and after the War of Northern Aggression. How have we fared, you and I, with the faith of our Confederate ancestors to the present day in which we live?

Our Confederate ancestors went back to their homes and any place some could find after Lee's surrender to pick up the pieces of their shattered lives only to find poverties of spirit and hope. Many families forsook any land or any possessions they had and went west. These scenes played out throughout the southland. Then, a subtle wind began to sweep through the old Confederacy which was unnoticed by the rest of the country, but not by the southern people. I have written in previous articles about the fervency of faith that not only our soldiers had during the war, but also our leaders. Robert E. Lee, Stonewall Jackson, Leonidas Polk, John Bell Hood and many other Confederate Generals, almost too many to mention, led a spiritual renewal among their troops. This renewed faith among the individual Confederate soldiers went home with them. Hebrews 10:38 says "the just shall live by faith." And Hebrews 11:6 says "it is impossible to please God without faith." Jesus came down from Heaven not to establish an earthly kingdom, but a spiritual kingdom, hence, the Kingdom of God. This is the Faith of our Fathers living still. "Blessed are the poor (not spiritually arrogant) in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of heaven." Matthew 5:3

Hebrews 11:1 says "Now faith is substance of things hoped for, the evidence not seen." My argument for the spiritual renewal of the south is, I believe, the evidence has been seen and felt for many decades, that is, the faith of our fathers. Let me explain. The two largest faith groups in our country are the Roman Catholic Church and the Southern Baptist Convention. The latter represents the largest evangelical community of faith. The Southern Baptist Convention was formed out of the Triennial convention in 1845 in Augusta, Georgia. The evangelical growth of this faith group, similar to many others which started in the south. grew out of the war shattered south whose people were and still are, evidently rich in spirit. The missionary endeavor of these southern faith groups has reached around the world, not only spreading the Christian Faith, but also its good works.

Yes, we are the defenders of the faith of our southern ancestors who lived and died for the southern cause of our Confederate heritage. This may be our greatest legacy, the defenders of the faith of our fathers who perpetuated the spiritual kingdom of our Lord.

# RECRUITMENT VISIT

Waul's Texas Legion S.C.V. Camp 2103 Katy, Texas







I was invited, April 3, 2024, to attend the Waul's Texas Legion S.C. V. Camp 2193 in Katy, Texas, to give a presentation on Robert E. Lee and to invite them to become members of the MOS&B.

My wife and I were warmly welcomed. This is a great S.C.V. Camp and several members expressed a desire to become MOS&B members.

We enjoyed the evening and it was great to meet other Confederate compatriots.

To continue to grow our membership, I encourage visits to other Confederate organizations to recruit and grow our chapters. Afterall, we are one Confederate family.







- 1. **He did not grow his famous beard until late in life:** Lee had always appeared younger than his years so in the winter of 1861, he grew whiskers which were white, and that made him look older.
- 2. **He was largely responsible for opening up the Mississippi River to navigation:** As an Army engineer in the 1830s, Lee was stationed in St. Louis and working with the forces of the river, directed the improvement of the channels of the Mississippi as to improve greatly its navigability.
- 3. **He was extremely frugal with money:** Lee's father, whom he barely knew, was a poor businessman and had whittled away the Lee estate putting a hardship on his mother. He adopted an attitude of extreme frugality and was very careful with his money.
- 4. **He corresponded with Whistler's mother:** While Lee was Superintendent at West Point, a young James Whistler was a cadet and a very poor one who failed many classes. Lee took a sincere interest in the boy and started writing his mother emphasizing the need for the boy to be diligent in his studies. After leaving the Academy, Whistler, became a famous artist, painting in 1871 the portrait that became known as "Whistler's Mother".
- 5. **He loved to flirt:** By all accounts he was a unfailingly faithful husband, but enjoyed the company of pretty, young women. He even delighted in telling his wife about his meetings. Lee told a friend that "pretty young women made his heart open to them, like a flower to the sun".
- 6. **He slept in a modest soldier's tent and ate the same rations as his men:** Lee turned down delicacies of food offered to him as well as to use homes of Southerners. He made it a point to share the daily hardships of his men as possible.
- 7. **He rode other horses besides Traveller during the Civil War:** When Lee purchased Traveller, he already had two horses, Richmond and Brown-Roan. Later he acquired Lucy Long who was a backup to Traveller and then Ajax who remained with Lee after the war.
- 8. **He disliked slavery and abhorred secession:** Lee never personally owned slaves, but he managed 200 slaves for five years at Arlington Plantation who had belonged to his father-in-law, George Washington Parke Custis, at his death. He said "Secession is nothing but revolution. I have been unable to make up my mind to raise my hand against my native state, my relations, my children and my home...and never desire again to draw my sword save in defense of my State. I consider it useless to go into the reasons that influenced me. I can give no advice. I merely tell you what I have done that you may do better".
- 9. He met Ulysses S. Grant a second time at Appomattox after the famous surrender: Lee and Grant had served together in the Mexican War. After the meeting at the McLean House, Grant tried to convince Lee to use his stature to persuade the remaining Confederate forces to surrender, but Lee said such a course would now be improper for him to take. After being indicted for treason, with threat of arrest and possible execution, Lee appealed to Grant, noting that he, Grant, had written "each officer and man will be allowed to return to his home, not to be disturbed by United States authority as long as they observe their paroles and the laws in force where they may reside". Grant concurred and urged Lee to apply for a federal pardon which he would endorse. Lee did, and after it was forwarded to President Andrew Johnson the application would be "lost" and Lee's citizenship would not be restored until 1975. What Lee did not know was that Grant quietly let it be known that he would resign from the army if Lee were to be arrested.
- 10. He turned down many lucrative business offers after the war ended: Lee returned to a modest house he had rented for his wife and family in Richmond after his Arlington estate had been seized by Union forces. With his legal status and financial resources much reduced, Lee looked for a way to make a living. He turned down every invitation to prosper by his name: president of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway, command the Romanian army, to be governor of Virginia, to preside over insurance companies and offered to move into an English manor house with an annual stipend. Lee at last found a position that suited him—the presidency of Washington College in Lexington. He revitalized the dying institution by adding practical courses in languages, engineering, commerce, farming and the first ever journalism school in the country.

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


